# **Behaviour Code**

Cross Ash is a Rights Respecting Community of learners where:

- every child's personality, talents and abilities should be developed to the full.
- we must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures, and the environment
- every child has the right to a voice on all issues that affect them and for their views to be taken seriously.
- all children have the same rights whatever their abilities, gender, ethnicity, religion, whatever they think or say and whatever their family background
- every child has the right to a safe childhood, protected from violence, abuse and exploitation.
- every child has the right to grow up in a family environment, free from adult responsibilities and with the opportunity to play.

## **Cross Ash School Charter**

### Aim of this policy

To support the implementation and maintenance of the charter.

### Objectives of the policy are:

- To ensure that there is agreed, acceptable behaviour for a safe and secure learning and teaching environment
- To ensure a consistent approach and clear boundaries so that children know what is expected of them and why
- To provide opportunities for children to develop self-awareness and personal responsibility
- To help children develop strategies to effectively manage their own behaviour and that of others
- To promote self-esteem and provide an environment where everyone feels equally valued
- To ensure that staff are aware of their collective responsibility and of relevant support structures
- To develop a partnership with parents in promoting positive behavior

Our aim is to praise, to commend pupils' successes, emphasise their potential and highlight their good behaviour.



- Lots of praise in class for good behaviour.
- The use of stickers and rewards by the Class teacher.
- Highlighting good behaviour in front of the class.
- The school has a "Good to be Green" scheme which is runs in each class, each year, and which provides incentives leading to Bronze, Silver, Gold and Platinum cards achieved over the course of a year.
- Celebration of your achievements during whole school awards assemblies.
- The presentation of golden leaves to the pupil of the week chosen by the Rights Respecting School Council placed on the Rights Respecting Tree .
- Good behaviour brought to the attention of the Headteacher by sending pupils to the HT office for praise.
- Excellent achievements brought to the attention of the Governors, parents, Friends of the School, media and the Local Authority.
